2. Study of Electrical Energy Consumption








Figure 2.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 3.1: Month wise CO2 Emission

In this Chapter, we study the Usage of Alternate/Renewable Energy to Annual Energy Requirement of the College. The Brahma valley campus has installed Roof Top solar thermal hot water system of 2000 liters capacity. The college have also installed 5 nos of solar PV street lights.

The College has already installed Rain Water Harvesting project, wherein the rain water falling on the terrace is collected and through pipes it is fed to Water Storage. This stored water is then reused for domestic purpose.

6.1 Solid Waste Management

The College has already installed a Bio composting Plant, wherein, the bio-degradable waste is composted & is used as fertilizer for the garden.

For canteen waste, college has installed biogas plant. Kitchen and other wastes (leftover cooked food (veg and non-veg), vegetable wastes are fed to biogas plant. The biogas generated is then used for cooking. Total capacity of biogas plant is 500 liters by volume. The college has more potential to for such biogas plant. The college is recommended to install more such plants with higher capacity.




Figure 2.1: Distribution of connected load.








Figure 3.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 4.1: Month wise CO2 Emission

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5. Study of utilities

5.1 Study of Lighting

In the facility, the lighting system can be divided mainly in to parts, indoor lighting and outdoor lighting. There are 83 FTL fittings with Electronic/ magnetic chokes, 37 nos of LED tubes, 122 nos of LED bulbs. It is recommended to install the 20 W LED Tube light fittings in place of these old T-8 fittings. There are 30 No of LED street lights.

5.2 Ceiling Fans

At building facility, there are about 79 Nos Old Ceiling Fans, which consumed about 65 W of Electrical Energy. It is recommended to replace these old Fans with BEE STAR Rated Ceiling Fans.

5.3 Water Pumps

There are in total 1 Water pumps with 5HP.






Figure 2.1 : Monthly Electrical Energy Consumption








Figure 2.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 3.1: Month wise CO2 Emission




Figure 2.1: Distribution of connected load.








Figure 3.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 4.1: Month wise CO2 Emission

5.1 Study of Lighting

In the facility, the lighting system can be divided mainly in to parts, indoor lighting and outdoor lighting. There are 83 FTL fittings with Electronic/ magnetic chokes, 37 nos of LED tubes, 122 nos of LED bulbs. It is recommended to install the 20 W LED Tube light fittings in place of these old T-8 fittings. There are 30 No of LED street lights.

5.2 Ceiling Fans

At building facility, there are about 79 Nos Old Ceiling Fans, which consumed about 65 W of Electrical Energy. It is recommended to replace these old Fans with BEE STAR Rated Ceiling Fans.

5.3 Water Pumps

There are in total 1 Water pumps with 5HP.

6. Study of usage of alternate energy

In this Chapter, we study the Usage of Alternate/Renewable Energy to Annual Energy Requirement of the College. The Brahma valley campus has installed Roof Top solar thermal hot water system of 2,000 liters capacity. The college have also installed 5 nos of solar PV street lights.






Figure 2.1 : Monthly Electrical Energy Consumption




Figure 2.1: Month wise energy consumption




Figure 2.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 3.1: Month wise CO2 Emission

6.1 Solid Waste Management

The College has already installed a Bio composting Plant, wherein, the bio-degradable waste is composted & is used as fertilizer for the garden.

For canteen waste, college has installed biogas plant. Kitchen and other wastes (leftover cooked food (veg and non-veg), vegetable wastes are fed to biogas plant. The biogas generated is then used for cooking. Total capacity of biogas plant is 500 liters by volume. The college has more potential to for such biogas plant. The college is recommended to install more such plants with higher capacity.




Figure 2.1: Distribution of connected load.








Figure 3.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 4.1: Month wise CO2 Emission

In the facility, the lighting system can be divided mainly in to parts, indoor lighting and outdoor lighting. There are 83 FTL fittings with Electronic/ magnetic chokes, 37 nos of LED tubes, 122 nos of LED bulbs. It is recommended to install the 20 W LED Tube light fittings in place of these old T-8 fittings. There are 30 No of LED street lights.

5.2 Ceiling Fans

At building facility, there are about 79 Nos Old Ceiling Fans, which consumed about 65 W of Electrical Energy. It is recommended to replace these old Fans with BEE STAR Rated Ceiling Fans.






Figure 2.1 : Monthly Electrical Energy Consumption


3.1 Air Pollution




Figure 2.1: Month wise energy consumption




Figure 2.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 3.1: Month wise CO2 Emission




Figure 2.1: Distribution of connected load.








Figure 3.2: Month wise electricity bill




Figure 4.1: Month wise CO2 Emission

In the facility, the lighting system can be divided mainly in to parts, indoor lighting and outdoor lighting. There are 83 FTL fittings with Electronic/ magnetic chokes, 37 nos of LED tubes, 122 nos of LED bulbs. It is recommended to install the 20 W LED Tube light fittings in place of these old T-8 fittings. There are 30 No of LED street lights.

5.2 Ceiling Fans

At building facility, there are about 79 Nos Old Ceiling Fans, which consumed about 65 W of Electrical Energy. It is recommended to replace these old Fans with BEE STAR Rated Ceiling Fans.






Figure 2.1 : Monthly Electrical Energy Consumption

In this Chapter, we present the various types of Pollution as under:


3.1 Air Pollution

The College is using two forms of Energies, namely: Thermal in the form of LPG and Electrical Energy used for day to day operations of the College. The major pollutant on account of above Energy forms is the Carbon Di Oxide.

- 1 unit (kWh) of Electrical Energy emits 0.8 Kg of CO₂ in the atmosphere
- 1 Kg of LPG emits 3 Kg of CO₂ in the atmosphere

3.2 Study of Solid Waste Generation

The College has already installed a Bio composting Plant, wherein, the biodegradable waste is composted & is used as fertilizer for the garden.

For canteen waste, college has installed biogas plant. Kitchen and other wastes (leftover cooked food (veg and non-veg), vegetable wastes are fed to biogas plant. The biogas generated is then used for cooking. Total capacity of biogas plant is 500 liters by volume. The college has more potential to for such biogas plant. The college is recommended to install more such plants with higher capacity.

3.3 Study of Liquid Waste Generation

The waste water generated in college campus is treated in Sewage Water Treatment Plant. This plant aims to remove contaminants from sewage to produce an effluent that is suitable for reuse application.

3.4 Study of e-Waste Management:

The internal communication is through emails and there is hardly any generation of e-Waste in the premises.

4. Study of Rain Water Harvesting

The College has already installed Rain Water Harvesting project, wherein the rain water falling on the terrace is collected and through pipes it is fed to underground Water Storage tank. This stored water is then reused for domestic purpose.

5. Recommendations

In order to reduce the dependency on Natural resources and also in order to reduce the various pollutions arising due to the day to day operations of the College we herewith recommend following recommendations.

• Installation of Sewage treatment Plant to make campus a Zero Discharge campus
